1. Paraphrasing:

A. Definition

Paraphrasing is the process of restating information from a source in your own words while retaining the original meaning. It involves altering the sentence structure and vocabulary of the original text, but the paraphrased version must remain accurate and faithful to the original idea.

Paraphrasing is a critical skill for academic writing, allowing you to incorporate ideas from other sources without directly quoting, which helps avoid plagiarism and demonstrates your understanding of the material.

B. Techniques for Effective Paraphrasing

1. Understand the Source Material

- Read the original text carefully to fully understand its meaning.
- Identify the main idea and supporting details.

2. Change Sentence Structure

- Reorganize the information by changing the sentence structure.
- For example, turn active voice into passive voice or vice versa.

3. Use Synonyms

- Replace key words with synonyms while maintaining the context.
- Avoid changing technical terms or phrases that lack synonyms.

Paraphrased: "The study produced unexpected outcomes."

4. Change Word Forms

• Convert nouns to verbs, adjectives to adverbs, or vice versa.

Original: "There was a significant improvement in test scores."

Paraphrased: "Test scores improved significantly."

5. Break Complex Sentences

• Split long, complex sentences into shorter ones for clarity.

Original: "The study, which was conducted over ten years, found a correlation between exercise and mental health."

Paraphrased: "The ten-year study found a link between exercise and mental health."

6. Combine Ideas

• Combine shorter sentences from the original text into a more concise version.

Original: "The weather was cold. The roads were icy."

Paraphrased: "The cold weather caused the roads to become icy."

 - Use simpler language or fewer words to convey the same idea without altering its meaning.

Original: "The utilization of renewable energy sources has surged in recent years due to environmental concerns."

Paraphrased: "The use of renewable energy has increased recently because of environmental worries."

B. Techniques for Effective Summary Writing

1. Read the Text Carefully

- \circ $\;$ Read the entire text to understand its main ideas and purpose.
- Look for headings, topic sentences, and concluding sentences to identify key points.

2. Identify the Main Ideas

- Highlight or underline the most important information, such as the thesis statement, arguments, and conclusions.
- Ignore minor details, examples, or redundant information.

3. Use Your Own Words

- \circ $\;$ Restate the main ideas without copying phrases directly from the source.
- Use synonyms and rephrase sentences while maintaining the original meaning.

4. Focus on Key Points

- Eliminate any background information, illustrations, or extra details.
- Keep only the content that is crucial to understanding the main message.

5. Keep it Concise

- Write as briefly as possible while covering all critical points.
- A summary should be significantly shorter than the original text.

6. Preserve the Original Meaning

- Avoid altering the intent, tone, or facts of the original material.
- Be objective and do not include personal opinions or interpretations.

7. Use Linking Words

• Use transitions like *therefore, however, additionally,* or *in summary* to maintain coherence and flow.

8. Write in Logical Order

• Present the summarized information in the same sequence as it appears in the original text for clarity.

9. Check for Accuracy

- Review your summary to ensure it captures the essence of the original and excludes unnecessary content.
- \circ $\,$ Confirm there are no misinterpretations or omissions of critical points.

- 4. Craft a Thesis: Define your main argument or theme.
- 5. Create Structure: Outline by themes, comparisons, or chronology.
- 6. Compose Cohesively: Write with flow, blending evidence and analysis.
- 7. Check and Cite: Revise for clarity and ensure proper citations.
