Present Simple

The Present Simple is a verb tense used to describe habits, general truths, repeated actions, and fixed schedules. It is one of the most commonly used tenses in English.

How to Form the Present Simple?

Subject	Verb Form (Base form / +s for he, she, it)
I	play / go / eat
You	play / go / eat
He/ she/It	plays / goes / eats
We / They	play / go / eat

Rule:

For he, she, it, add -s or -es to the base verb.

Examples:

- He plays football.
- She **goes** to work at 8 AM.
- It **rains** a lot in winter.

If the verb ends in -y after a consonant, change y to i and add -es:

Examples:

- Study → studies
- Try \rightarrow tries

When do we use the Present Simple?

1. Habits and Routines (Things we do regularly)

- They **go** to school on weekdays.
- I eat breakfast every morning.
- they speak English every day.
- We sleep every night.
- They **go** to the beach **every weekend.**

2. General Facts and Universal Truths

- The sun **rises** in the east.
- Water **boils** at 100°C.
- Cats **hate** water.
- The human body **contains** 206 bones.
- Light **travels** at almost 300,000 kilometres per second.

3. Fixed Schedules (Timetables, Programs, Official Plans)

- The train **leaves** at 6 PM.
- Our class **starts** at 9 AM.
- The store **closes** at 10 PM.

4. Permanent Situations and States

- He **lives** in London.
- She works as a teacher.
- They **own** a small business.
- I'm nineteen years old.
- I'm a student.

5. Instructions and Directions

- You **go** straight, then turn left.
- First, you **mix** the ingredients.

Present simple questions

➤ Look at these questions:

Do you play football? Where do you live? Does Sami play football? Where does he come from? Do Rima and Ania live in Egypt? Where do they work?

- ➤ We use do and does to make questions with the present simple. We use does for the third person singular (she/he/it) and do for the others.
- We use do and does with question words like where, what and when:

Where do Ania and Rima live?

What does Ania do?

When does Rima usually get up?

> But questions with **who** often don't use do or does:

Who lives in London?

Who plays football at the weekend?

Who works at Algiers City Hospital?

Here are some useful questions. Try to remember them:

Where do you come from?	What work do you do?
Do you come from?	Do you like?
Where do you live?	Do you know?
Do you live in?	

Negative form of Present Simple

Use don't (do not) / doesn't (does not) + base verb

Subject	Negative Form
I / You / We / They	don't + base verb
He / She / It	doesn't + base verb

- I like tennis but I **don't like** football. (don't = do not)
- I don't live in Algeria now.
- They **don't work** at the weekend.
- he **doesn't live** in Egypt. (doesn't = does not)
- Ania doesn't drive to work. She goes by bus.
- I don't like spicy food.
- She doesn't watch TV

Questions in Present Simple

Use Do / Does + subject + base verb

Subject	Question Form
I / You / We / They	Do + subject + base verb?
He / She / It	Does + subject + base verb?

- **Do** you play football? → Yes, I do. / No, I don't
- **Does** she like coffee? \rightarrow Yes, she does. / No, she doesn't.
- **Do** they live in Spain? \rightarrow Yes, they do. / No, they don't.

Note: When using **does** in a question, the verb remains in **its base form**:

- Does she like pizza? (correct)
- Does she likes pizza? (incorrect)

Time Expressions used with Present Simple (using frequency)

- > Always, usually, often, sometimes, rarely, never
- > Every day, every week, every month
- > On Mondays, in the morning, at night

Examples:

- She always drinks coffee in the morning.
- We **often** go to the gym.
- I never eat fast food.
- Lina is always on time for class.
- The weather is **usually** hot in July.
