### **Future Simple**

The **Future Simple** tense is used to describe actions or events that will occur after the present moment. It's a fundamental tense for expressing future intentions, predictions, promises, or spontaneous decisions.

#### 1. Structure

## **Affirmative:** Subject + will + base verb

- will travel to Paris next month.
- She will start her new job tomorrow.

## **Negative:** Subject + will not (won't) + base verb

- He will not attend the meeting.
- They won't finish the project on time.

# **Interrogative:** Will + subject + base verb?

- Will you join us for dinner?
- Will it rain tomorrow?

**Note:** The auxiliary verb "will" remains constant for all subjects.

#### 2. Usage

- Decisions made at the moment of speaking:
  - o I'm tired. I will take a nap.
- Predictions based on opinions or experiences:
  - o I think it will snow this evening.
- Promises or offers:
  - o I will help you with your homework.
- Future facts or certainties:
  - o The sun will rise at 6:00 AM tomorrow.

#### 3. "Shall" vs. "Will"

Traditionally, "shall" is used with "I" and "we" to indicate future actions, while "will" is used with "you," "he," "she," "it," and "they." However, in modern English, "will" is predominantly used for all subjects. "Shall" is now more common in formal or legal contexts.

## 4. "Be Going To" Construction

Another way to express future intentions or plans is by using "be going to."

# Structure: Subject + am/is/are + going to + base verb

- I am going to start a new course next week.
- They are going to visit their grandparents this weekend.

## Usage:

- Planned actions or intentions: She is going to study medicine.
- Predictions based on current evidence: Look at those clouds. It is going to rain soon.

# **5.** Time Expressions Commonly Used with Future Simple

- Tomorrow: We will meet tomorrow.
- Next (week, month, year): He will graduate next year.
- In (a period of time): They will arrive in two hours.
- Soon: I will call you soon.
