Diplomatic Translation

(Introduction)

Definitions:

Translation: is defined by the Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary the process of changing something that is written or spoken into another language.

Diplomatic translation: being diplomatic means being able to or skilled in negotiating between individuals, groups and nations. When linked to translation, it is the translation of diplomatic content (speeches, letters, treaties and agreements) by translators who usually work in foreign affairs with other diplomats.

Diplomacy and Politics:
