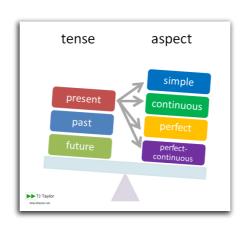

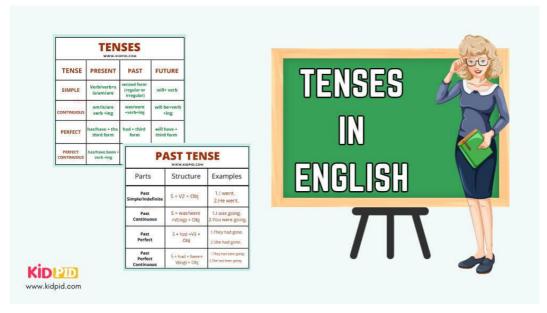

# Introduction



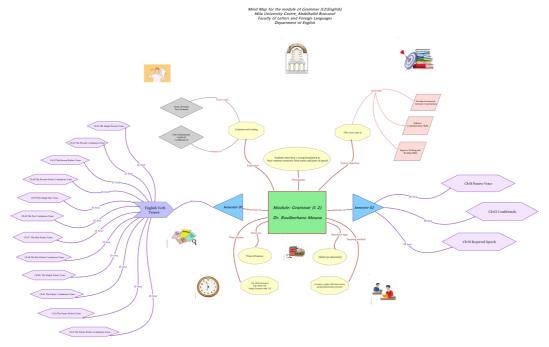
Tenses\* or **English tenses** are grammatical tools used to **express time in language**. They help indicate when an action takes place—whether in the **past**, **present**, or **future**. Each tense reflects a specific aspect of time and can show whether an action is ongoing, completed, or repeated. Understanding tenses is essential for **clear and accurate communication**, as they allow speakers and writers to structure their ideas logically across time.

# **Pr-requisites**



# To be able to properly follow the lesson of Present tenses, the students must have some prior knowledge, likewise:

## • Basic Understanding of Verb Forms:

Students should be familiar with verb forms (e.g., regular vs. irregular verbs) in the infinitive form and the base form of verbs.

## • Familiarity with Subject Pronouns:

Students need to know subject pronouns (I, you, he, she, it, we, they) to form sentences correctly.

#### • Basic Sentence Structure:

Students should understand the basic sentence structure (S\*+V\*+O\*), especially in simple affirmative sentences.

## • Simple Use of Articles (a, an, the):

Understanding the use of articles can help in forming sentences correctly with nouns in present tenses.

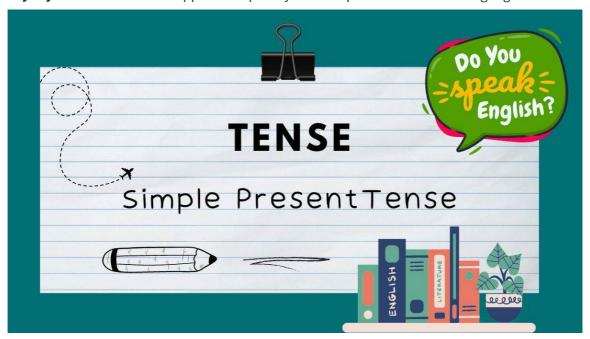

# **The Simple Present Tense**



**The Present Simple tense** is one of the most commonly used tenses in English, forming the foundation for **everyday communication**. It appears frequently in both spoken and written language.

## **The Simple Present Tense**



The is Simple Present Tense used to describe habitual actions, general truths, fixed arrangements, and feelings. It expresses facts or things that happen regularly.

## 2. Form

In the affirmative the Simple Present has the same form as the infinitive but adds an "s" for the third person singular.

## **Spelling notes:**

• Verbs ending in **ss, sh, ch, x** and **o** add **"es"**, instead of **"s"** alone, to form the third person singular:

I kiss, he kisses

I box, he boxes

• When "y" follows a consonant we change the y into "i" and add "es":

I carry, he carries

I copy, he copies

• But verbs ending in **y** following a **vowel** obey the usual rule:

I obey, he obeys

I say, he says

## 3. Use

The Present Simple Tense is one of the most commonly used tenses in English. It helps us express actions and situations that are **regular**, **factual**, or **permanent**. This tense is essential for daily communication, whether in speaking or writing. We use the Simple Present in the following situations:

# 3.1. Expressing Habitual Actions:

When talking about habitual actions, the simple present tense is mainly used. This tense helps convey actions that are **regular** or **part of a routine**. It is the suitable tense for discussing **daily habits**, **weekly routines**, or any activity that happens on a **regular** basis.



- Mr. Brown generally **leaves** the house at eight o'clock in the morning.
- I play football every weekend.



This tense does not tell us whether or not the action is being performed at the moment of speaking and if we want to make it clear we must add a verb in the **present continuous tense**.

e.g. My dog barks a lot, but It is not necessarily barking at the moment.

## **Time Expressions and Adverbs of Frequency**

Using **adverbs of frequency**<sup>1</sup> can help specify how often these habitual actions occur. Common adverbs of frequency include **always**, **usually**, **often**, **sometimes**, **rarely**, **and never**.

Other *time expressions*\* are also used to describe **when** an action takes place, or **how often** something happens. They provide a specific frequency for actions, offering a detailed understanding of when the action occurs or how regularly it occurs.



- Always: I always drink coffee in the morning.
- Usually: She usually goes for a run in the evening.
- **Often:** They **often** visit their grandparents on weekends.
- Every day: She practices the piano every day
- In the morning: I read the newspaper in the morning.
- Once a week: We have a team meeting once a week.
- Three times a year: They travel abroad three times a year.

#### **Time Clauses**

We often use the simple present with time clauses expressing routine or habitual actions.



- Whenever it rains, the roof leaks.
- When you open the door, a light goes on.

## 3.2. Informal Instructions:

In informal contexts, the present simple tense is sometimes used to give *instructions*\*, especially when **recounting a process** or **explaining steps** in a casual or conversational manner. This is common in spoken English, or informal written guides.



• You take 300 g of flour and add three eggs.

# 3.3. Something that is True in the Present:

The Present Simple Tense is used to describe facts or situations that are **true at the present time**. These facts can be **generally true**, or **currently valid**\*, even if they might change in the future.



- I am 19 years old.
- London is the capital of Britain.

# 3.4. Something that is Always True

The Present Simple Tense is used to describe things that are, such as natural laws, **always true** scientific facts, and general truths. These facts **do not change over time** and remain valid regardless of when they are stated.

#### **Natural Laws and Scientific Facts:**



- Water boils at 100°C.
- The human body contains 206 bones.
- Gravity **pulls** objects toward the Earth.

These are **unchanging scientific facts**, so we use the Present Simple to describe them.

## **General Truths and Simple Facts:**



Exemple

- Ice **melts** in warm temperatures.
- A year has 12 months.
- The sun **rises** in the east and sets in the west.

These statements are **permanently true**, which is why the Present Simple is the correct tense to use.

## 3.5. Planned Future:

The Simple Tense Present is commonly used to talk about scheduled, timetabled, or officially planned future events, especially for transportation, public events, and fixed schedules. This usage gives the impression that the event is definite and not subject to change.

## For Timetables and Schedules (e.g., transport, school, events):



Exemple

- The train **leaves** at 8:30 AM tomorrow.
- The meeting starts at 10 AM next Monday.
- Our flight arrives at 6 PM.

## **For Officially Fixed Events:**



Exemple

- The school term **begins** in September.
- The concert **starts** at 7 PM.
- The shop closes at midnight.

#### For Events in Programs or Itineraries:



Exemple

- The movie **premieres** next Friday.
- The professor **gives** a lecture at 3 PM.



Remarque

We use the Present Simple instead of the Future Tense when talking about events that follow a fixed schedule or timetable rather than personal plans.

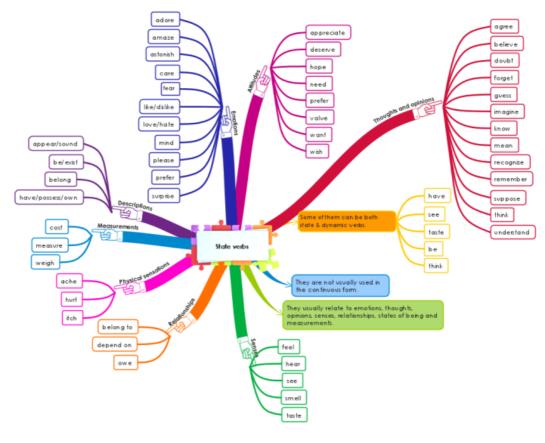

## 3.7. With Stative Verbs:

The Simple Present is used Instead of the Present Continuous form of certain verbs which are not used in the

Continuous (*stative verbs*\*, these are **verbs of opinion** such as believe, like, doubt, and **verbs of perception**:

see, hear, know, understand, etc.)



Stative Verbs



- I believe this house is haunted.
- I often **hear** strange **noises** at night.

These examples show how the Present Simple helps us describe situations clearly and effectively in everyday English.

**The Present Simple tense** is a **fundamental part** of English grammar, used to express general truths, habits, routines, and fixed schedules. It provides a clear and straightforward way to describe actions that are regular, permanent, or universally true. By mastering the Present Simple, learners can effectively communicate about daily activities, scientific facts, and scheduled events.

# Glossaire



#### **Stative Verb**

A verb that describes a state or condition rather than an action. Stative verbs (e.g., know, love, belong) are typically not used in the Present Continuous tense.

#### **Tenses**

forms of verbs that show the time of an action (e.g., present, past, future).

## **Time Expressions**

Words or phrases that help to specify the time frame of an action, often used with present tenses. Examples include every day, always, now, right now, often.
